The maximum credit toward the 124 hours required for the Bachelor of Arts degree that a student may apply in one subject-matter field is 40 hours.

 A student must have a minimum of 84 hours outside the one subject-matter field that can be counted toward graduation.

To be admitted to Jewell: transfer students must have at minimum transferrable GPA of at least a 2.5 with at least 12 hours completed post-high school graduation.

The courses suggested in this guide are the preferred courses that best prepare students for success at William Jewell College. For a *Level 2 Explorations requirement in the William Jewell College core curriculum to be fulfilled using transfer credit, students MUST have successfully completed two (2) courses in two (2) different disciplines.

MCCKC courses used to fulfill William Jewell College Level 2 Core Curriculum Requirements are as follows:

Culture and Traditions: ART 108 AND ENGL 268

Science Technology and the Human Experience: BIOL 101 AND PHYS 106

*Any course designated as a "Level 2 Explorations course" will transfer as an elective if the student transfers to Jewell with less than 26 hours completed post-high school graduation OR does not successfully complete the 2 suggested classes required for each category.

- Students must complete a college-level second introductory course in a world language (the 112 course at Jewell or the equivalent) or a higher-level course.
- It is suggested that students who have previously studied a world language but who have not yet earned credit for a college-level second introductory course take the language placement exam to further help with proper placement. Transfer students with high placement scores (above the 112 level) will be invited to take an optional 112 equivalency exam with a faculty member in the Languages Department. Passing this equivalency exam satisfies the B.A. world language requirement.
